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# The Year in Review

In 2022 Singing Creek Educational Center (SCEC) rebounded from the COVID-19 years, bringing back our inperson programming while maintaining more relaxed masking protocols. Our location was the historic Dr. Snapp House in Cottage Grove, until November. The Golddiggers & Prospector's Club, the house owners, lost their insurance on the house in early 2022, that impacted our programs negatively. We had to cancel several programs in March and April, leading to lost revenue. In Fall they needed to do some remodeling on the house and wanted to utilize the space for their own purposes, so our contract was terminated. We bounced back by partnering with other local organizations such as the Dorena Grange to host our programs.

### **Community Partners and Initiatives**

We partnered with the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce to host an alternative Halloween experience for kids. Our booths downtown in the main square featured volunteers in fun costumes offering game experiences that were not candy-based, with a much smaller footprint and specially designed for kids with sensory issues or developmental disabilities. Families that stopped by appreciated this focus.

**Our Los Pueblos Summer Camp for local Latinx/Guatemalan families** had a successful second year, funded by the City of Cottage Grove and Oregon Community Foundation. We partnered with the Family Resource Center on this project, hiring two local Latina instructors, and serving 20 children with free day camp based on the history of Mexico and Guatemala.

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**For Earth Day, we partnered with EcoGeneration,** a local recycling nonprofit, to bring the Green Living Fair to downtown Cottage Grove, inspiring people to live more eco-friendly lives. This one-day event drew about 250 people and included 25 vendors, a children's art show and contest, a silent auction, and community workshops. We worked with local schools and had 5 classrooms of children participate by creating art for the art show, sponsored by the Woodard Family Foundation. Numerous volunteers helped with all aspects of bringing this event to life.

In keeping with our values of culturally responsive teaching, **we worked with the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde** to examine and update our Kalapuya Ways curriculum and our Lewis & Clark Program to ensure best practices. Their Curriculum Specialist provided us with photos of modern-day Tribal Members engaged in cultural practices, and we purchased modern clothing designed by Tribal artists for our Kalapuya interpreters. Teachers were impressed with our careful and respectful handling of Oregon's history and this is our **fastest growing program, increasing by 50% in 2022**.

# **Our Impact**

In 2022 we served 869 children and 120 families across five Oregon counties and six school districts from Salem to Riddle. One of our programs is available for purchase online at the "Teachers Pay Teachers" website.

**Our Hands-On Homeschool program saw the biggest enrollment ever**, including 40% children with autism, special needs, or learning disabilities. Our students learn about Oregon's history and how our choices today impact the future through engaging activities. We've gathered feedback from the students and parents to improve this program over time, incorporating more special guests and nature exploration.

**In November we worked with a local Navajo Nation elder**, Ruth Bixel, who spoke with 17 Girl Scouts at our Native American Heritage Day at the Cottage Grove Community Center. This event was made possible in part by a grant from the Lane County Cultural Coalition.



In Fall, Karen attended an Educational Summit by the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde in Oregon, and several other professional webinars.




# Key Staff and Volunteers

# Looking Forward

SCEC is in a transition period, as we look forward to our relocation to a new site in the Cottage Grove/ Creswell area in early 2024. Development of our Board of Directors and Advisory Council is a key priority for 2023, leading up to strategic planning and capacity building activities for the next two to three years.

As we grow, maintaining close relationships with Tribal partners and BIPOC organizations in Oregon will continue to be important. Our goal is to tell the story of history in an accurate and respectful way, providing resources and talking points for teachers and parents in our community. When history is taught honestly, students gain a better understanding of current systemic issues and feel empowered to take action to ensure equity, justice and liberation are a reality for all.
