To inspire children and families toward an appreciation of local history through hands-on learning.

The Year in Review

In 2023, Singing Creek Educational Center (SCEC) partnered with many local organizations in Western Oregon and brought our programs to more counties than ever before. Being mobile allowed us to branch out to schools as far away as Portland, Salem, and Roseburg. We also launched the Acorn Circle program in partnership with three local libraries, bringing Indigenous children's education to hundreds of families. Our Executive Director worked closely with tribal partners to bring education on traditional Kalapuya ways to children and adults at three summer events in Linn County. We served more people than ever before!

Featured Community Partners and Initiatives

Los Pueblos Summer Camp at the Park

SCEC had a successful third year of this popular program, funded by the Yarg Family Foundation and the City of Cottage Grove. We partnered with the Family Resource Center and hired our Latina instructor from there. This program served 22 low-income Guatemalan children with a free day camp based on the history of Mexico and Guatemala, including transportation and meals.





Native American Cultural Encampments Partnership

We partnered with the Native American Cultural Association of Oregon and Deitrich Peters to bring Kalapuya Ways education to three campout events at Linn County parks. Hundreds of families learned about indigenous culture and made handcrafts while enjoying food and traditional music and dancing. We have been invited back for the next year and have been asked to expand into one of their tipis with storytelling and children's books.



Acorn Circle Library Program: 3 Libraries

We adapted children's curriculum from the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde to teach younger children about local Indigenous culture. Cottage Grove, Creswell, and Springfield libraries received sessions including a story, game, and craft, highlighting language arts learning. Each library hosted a cultural presentation with our Executive Director and Deitrich Peters, a local Kalapuya culture-bearer. These presentations allowed local families to learn about indigenous culture directly from Mr. Peters, including flute playing and storytelling. This program is funded by Woodard Family Foundation, the City of Cottage Grove, and participating libraries.

SMJ house History Homeschool/Field Trips

Our hands-on homeschool was full again this year, with 10 kids coming to the historic Shelton-McMurphey-Johnson House in Eugene once a month for a day of unique educational experiences about history and nature. This year several classes came from Portland and Salem for our history field trips, as word is spreading about our high-quality programs. These history programs include learning about the pioneer settlers, fur trappers, and Native Americans.




Our Impact

In 2023, SCEC served 3200 people across seven Oregon counties and six school districts from Portland to Riddle. We reached new audiences in libraries, schools, and parks, and requests come in regularly from new areas.

We taught 484 students at outdoor school presenting Kalapuya culture and atlat! throwing (a hunting tool). One Native boy, after throwing the atlat! for the first time in the field, said excitedly, "I feel like I've finally come alive!" His statement reflects the enthusiasm for our programs we see repeatedly.

Our homeschool remains full, including 20% children with autism, special needs, or learning disabilities. Our students learn about Oregon's history and how our choices today impact the future through engaging activities.








Many of our volunteers come from the Cottage Grove/Creswell area and step in to support us with special events such as the Pleasant Hill Pioneer Day and the Grandparents' Pioneer Tea. Children often volunteer with their parents to help at our booths at fairs, such as the Bohemia Mining Days Festival. In 2023, we worked more extensively with the Assistance League of Eugene volunteers who provide living history programming at the Lane County History Museum. SCEC donated more authentic materials to their Kalapuya teaching kit and brought our

Kalapuya Ways presentation to their adult volunteers to further their learning.

Looking Forward

As we grow, maintaining close relationships with Tribal partners and BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, Person of Color) organizations in Oregon will continue to be important. Our goal is to relate Oregon's history in an accurate and respectful way, providing resources and talking points for teachers and parents in our community. New programs and events will be developed through this lens of equity and compassion. When history is taught honestly, students gain a better understanding of current systemic issues and feel empowered to take action to ensure equity and justice are a reality for all.

As we add new board and committee members from the community, we seek to become more sustainable for the long term and forge new and stronger partnerships with other organizations and cities. Our reputation in the community is very positive, with great name recognition and participation by families and schools. This success should help us launch more programs and grow our staff, volunteers, donor base, and budget in future years.
